Message From the CEO



Dear RenWest Community,

2021 was a year of establishing new norms in our community. Coming out of the isolation phase of the pandemic, we had to learn how to rebuild the in-person engagement that is a necessity for place-based work. At the same time, we solidified some game-changing aspects of virtual convening that came about for most of us out of necessity. And with it all, we remained true to our mission and vision to improve peoples' lives by ending intergenerational poverty with our holistic community-building approach.

And you, the community, remained here with us. Our resident partners continued to pursue their dreams of economic mobility through our programs and in returning to work. Our students returned to the classroom, welcomed by a new principal and administration at the Renaissance West STEAM Academy (RWSA). Our program partners offered over 160 program sessions (virtual and in-person) despite another difficult logistical year. This included over 200 families being served fresh foods by The Bulb at our weekly market, and 2 grocery distribution events via Food Lion Feeds. Digi-Bridge and Kids in the Kitchen returned in the fall of 2021; financial management classes resumed through a new partnership with DreamKey; and there were many more collaborations that continued to position our community for success.

Because of our incredible supporters, we were able to expand our service offerings. We outfitted the RenWest Training Center powered by a generous donation from Lowe's. We increased our Life Navigation services, expanded support for the LatinX Community, enhanced our Natural Learning Environment at the Howard Levine Child Development Center (HLCDC), continued our United Neighborhoods programming by the United Way of Central Carolinas, distributed over 50 laptops with services for our families, and implemented community-wide Wi-Fi with the City of Charlotte.

We are truly grateful for all of our partners and supporters. From my outstanding teammates who work alongside me with our incredible neighbors and program friends, to the support of an engaged, informed, passionate Board of Directors, we could not do this work for our residents and carry on the vision of our predecessors who dreamed this possibility.

So as we look to the coming year, we ask for your continued faith and support in even greater measure. We are proud to be a part of Renaissance West Community Initiative and grateful to have partners like you as we work to change peoples' lives for the better.



Built on a History of Purpose

About our Vibrant Village

In 2009, INLIVIAN (formerly Charlotte Housing Authority) received a \$20.9 million HOPE VI grant to revitalize Boulevard Homes, a former public housing site, into a vibrant village called the Renaissance. Community leaders recognized that housing alone wasn't moving the needle and envisioned a mixed-income community with plans for an education village and supportive services for families. The need for housing and wrap-around support services was essential.

With support from Purpose Built Communities, Renaissance West Community Initiative (RWCI) was launched to help end the cycle of intergenerational poverty and improve economic mobility for residents living on West Boulevard near the Billy Graham Parkway. RenWest today serves 1300+ residents in the Renaissance and Little Rock Apartment neighborhoods, including 800+ students at the on-site Renaissance West STEAM Academy and Howard Levine Child Development Center.

Our work to end intergenerational poverty in a geographic area that for decades has experienced the most severe impact of structural injustice and socio-economic disparities, is still in its early stages. We continue to strengthen and expand our holistic approach to achieving life-long transformation for the community through our Purpose Built model, leveraging existing institutions, networks, and capital to improve community outcomes.

RenWest, the Community Quarterback, is at the Heart of the Purpose-Built Model of Success

COMMUNITY WELLNESS:

The holistic place-based programs and services offered year-round at RenWest assist residents in their quest toward economic mobility and self-sufficiency. Life Navigation coaches, available to everyone, work individually with residents and families to help them develop goals and a pathway to achieve those goals. Coordinating access to health and wellness services further helps to weave a cohesive plan of care from among an often complex network of service providers, getting results and solutions for our families.

QUALITY MIXED-INCOME HOUSING:

The Residences at Renaissance includes 334 units of residential housing comprising 110 apartments for seniors (age 65+) at The Retreat, and 224 units of mixed-income family apartments and townhomes. Mixed-income communities enable families from diverse backgrounds to become neighbors and share pride in an enhanced quality of life for everyone.



CRADLE-TO-CAREER EDUCATIONAL CONTINUUM: RenWest is home to the Howard Levine Child Development Center a five-star early learning facility

Center, a five-star early learning facility, and the Renaissance West STEAM Academy, a jointly governed Pre-K-8th-grade CMS School.

Adult learning opportunities include partnerships with Central Piedmont Community College and UNC-Charlotte as well as workforce development and skills and trades training programs through partnerships that include NC Works, She Built This City, and area businesses that nurture our education village.

Renaissance West In The Spotlight

Lowe's and Lowe's Foundation committed \$3 million over three years to support RWCI's West Charlotte revitalization model. Lowe's funds will be used to expand our Life Navigation, workforce development, and community place-making programs and create an on-site Training Center -- The RenWest Training Center Powered by Lowe's. This Center is being dedicated to advancing our on-site career pathways and initiatives in skilled trades and skills training.



Secretary Fudge of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development, Mayor Vi Lyles, and representatives from area manufacturing visited and toured the RenWest campus to share and promote the administration's housing and workforce development priorities.



RWCI partnered with UNCC and JCSU researchers, local government, and community leaders to focus attention on solutions to food insecurity in West Charlotte neighborhoods that include designing community-owned, food cooperatives through the Community Innovation Incubator.





The Charlotte business community demonstrated its support for RWCl and our inaugural fundraising event, Renaissance Mentors, by lighting the Uptown Charlotte skyline with RenWest's blue and green signature colors. This lighting display was an uplifting demonstration of our community leaders' commitment to end intergenerational poverty and ensure upward mobility for all in our City.

RWCI CEO Mack McDonald was featured in a podcast focused on how the RWCI education village, including the RenWest STEAM Academy elevates educational opportunities for everyone, regardless of income.

WTVI PBS Charlotte invited RWCI CEO Mack McDonald to join a panel of local leaders to discuss Ken Burns's documentary Muhammad Ali and reflect on the champion's legacy and impact today.

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
