## BUILT ON A HISTORY OF PURPOSE

In 2009, INLIVIAN (formerly Charlotte Housing Authority) received a \$20.9 million HOPE VI grant to revitalize Boulevard Homes, a former public housing site, into a vibrant village called the Residences at Renaissance. Community leaders recognized that housing alone wasn't moving the needle and envisioned a mixed-income community with plans for an education village and supportive services for families. The need for housing and wrap-around support services was essential.

With support from Purpose Built Communities, Renaissance West Community Initiative (RWCI) was launched to help end the cycle of intergenerational poverty and improve economic mobility for residents living on West Boulevard near the Billy Graham Parkway. RenWest today serves 1800+ residents in the Renaissance and Little Rock Apartments neighborhoods, including 800+ students at the onsite Renaissance West STEAM Academy and Howard Levine Child Development Center.

Our work to end intergenerational poverty in a geographic area, that for decades has experienced the most severe impact of structural injustice and socio-economic disparities, is still in its early stages. We continue to strengthen and expand our holistic approach to achieving life-long transformation for the community through our Purpose Built model, leveraging existing institutions, networks and capital to improve community outcomes.

## 2022 NEIGHBORHOOD HIGHLIGHTS

**Leadership Level Corporate Donors** – Lowe's and Bank of America – continued their multi-year commitment of support for programming targeted to financial literacy, job training, life navigation, early childhood and Pre K-8 education.



**Bank of America** partnered with the Renaissance West STEAM Academy, supporting faculty and staff in educating our children and providing programming to help our adults achieve financial independence. Other Corporate donors added their support, enabling RenWest families and children to continue to thrive (see list of names, pg. 11).

The **Charlotte Mecklenburg Library** hosted technology literacy sessions at The Retreat introducing the older adults to email basics and digital communications. In addition, the new mobile library visited the community bi-monthly to offer residents convenient access to the library's resources.



Our community celebrated the opening of the RenWest Training Center Powered by **Lowe's** in November – a dedicated space to host residents seeking jobs and skills training.

U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Region IV Senior Leadership: Mr. José Alvarez (Regional Administrator), Ms. Tiffany Cobb (Deputy Regional Administrator), and North Carolina Field Office team members visited RenWest to meet with Mayor Vi Lyles and other city and statewide housing partners to discuss affordable housing priorities and areas for future collaboration.



Food Lion Feeds continued to help nourish families through their monthly product distribution. In addition, local executives and volunteers prepared and delivered 800 complimentary product bags to residents for the holidays.

**PricewaterhouseCoopers** (PwC) brought cheer to RenWest all year through their neighborhood beautification efforts. Additionally, their time and talent made each holiday event in the community special.

Undergraduate members of the Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc. collaborated with Digi-Bridge and Lowe's to celebrate RWSA's last day of school by conducting service projects.



Representatives of the **Carolina Panthers team** conducted their Play 60 Camp experience for RWSA students. The camp creatively nurtured youth development and physical activity.

N.C. Governor Roy Cooper and Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. members from around the country assembled back-toschool book bags full of supplies for RWSA students. They also assisted in beautification projects, spent time with older adult residents, engaged in student mentorship, and served lunch to the children and families of the community.



More than 150 community leaders, donors, and guests attended our 2<sup>nd</sup> Annual Renaissance Mentors Event. Attendees bid during our Live and Silent Auctions to win incredible experiences for the top bidder and members of the RenWest community.

## 2022 VOLUNTEER HIGHLIGHTS

Volunteers donated over 1,000 hours of service to RenWest and continue to have an incredible impact on building community goodwill. They brought a host of support to our community in the form of professional development for staff at Renaissance West STEAM Academy, organizing a community Parent Teacher Association, holiday lunches for residents and RWSA teachers, bingo and crafts for our seniors, gardening, beautification, mentorship and much more. 
